



- ◆ Since 2001, total statewide fall enrollment has increased 2.1% per year from 114,818 in fall 2001 to 131,710 in fall 2008.






Total Fall Enrollment by Student Level Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions and For-Profit/Career Schools


% of Total Fall Enrollment by Student Level Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions and For-Profit/Career Schools



Graduate enrollments accounted for higher percentages of total fall enrollment in 2008 than in in 2001, statewide, and at:








Nebraska Public Colleges and Universities Fall Enrollment Divided by 12-Month Enrollment



Total Full-Time Faculty Compared to Total Fall Student Enrollment Fall 1998-Fall 2008 Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions




- ◆ Increases in faculty generally parallel increases in fall enrollment. The correlation between the number of full-time faculty and fall student enrollment, statewide, was 0.94 for 1998 through 2008.

% 10-Year Changes in Full-Time Instructional Faculty and Fall Student Enrollment by Sector Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions




- ◆ This analysis does not include part-time faculty, and changes in fall student enrollment may or may not accurately reflect changes in faculty workloads. Therefore, results should be interpreted only as a broad, general comparison.

Total Full-Time Instructional Faculty by Rank (Assistant Professor to Full Professor) Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions



- ◆ Statewide, there has been a recent decline in the number of associate professors while the numbers of full-time instructional faculty at all other ranks and no academic rank increased between fall 1998 and fall 2008.



- ◆ The percentages of faculty who are Hispanics, black non-Hispanics or Native Americans trail the percentages of students in these three racial/ethnic groups. However, the percentages of faculty who are white non-Hispanics, Asian/Pacific Islanders or non-resident aliens are higher than the percentages of students in these groups.


- ◆ The average 9-month salary for full-time instructional faculty increased 37.3% from \$47,030 in fall 1998 to \$64,556 in fall 2008.
- ◆ The average faculty salary adjusted for inflation increased 5.2% from 1998 to 2008, from \$61,342 to \$64,556.

Average 9-Month Salaries vs. Inflation by Sector For Full-Time Instructional Faculty Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions



- ◆ Overall, increases in average faculty salaries slightly outpaced inflation over the past 10 years.

% Ratio of the Average 9-Month Salaries of Female Full-Time Instructional Faculty to Male Faculty by Sector Nebraska Public and Independent Institutions



- ◆ There is a continuing gap between the average salaries received by male and female full-time instructional faculty, except at the instructor level where women earn, on the average, more than men.
