WELCOME

Dr. Mike Baumgartner, Executive Director, introduced Dr. Daniel Hanson, President of Peru State College, to address the Commission. He noted that Dr. Hanson will be retiring on June 30, congratulating him on his many years at Peru state College.

Dr. Hanson welcomed the Commissioners to the campus. He commented that Peru State College (PSC) started in June of 1867, focusing on teacher education, and evolved through the years growing into the beautiful campus it is today. Peru State College has an open-access mission, where the focus is on affordability, breaking down barriers, and involving students by transforming their lives through personal and engaging experiences. PCS is the first in the state to incorporate geo-thermal into their facilities. Dr. Hanson said a renovation and addition to the student center is on the horizon.

Dr. Hanson stated that PSC is a part of the Nebraska Career Scholarship Program, which funds scholarships for high need areas of education, business computer information systems, and criminal justice. Dr. Hanson noted they are proud to partner with Nebraska State Corrections offering a program called Corrections Leadership Program. This is an earn-and-learn program beginning in the fall, with 15 to 20 students who will get tuition and a stipend to help them develop into leaders for the correctional system. He thanked the Commission for its support to the mission of Peru State College.

SPEAKER

Dr. Paul Turman, Chancellor for the Nebraska State College System, stated that over the course of the last twelve years President Hanson oversaw close to \$55 million invested in Peru State College facilities through revenue bonds, student investments, state funds, 309 taskforce, or foundation support. Dr. Turman spoke on changes the state colleges witnessed and learned over the last year during the pandemic, along with processes moving forward.

Executive Director's Report

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Commissioner Garman reported that he, along with Commissioners Von Behren, Aspen, and Bernthal, made up the nominating committee for Commission officers for 2021-2022. He presented the Committee's slate of nominations for Commission Chair, Vice Chair, and two other members of the 2021-2022 Executive Committee.

The Nominating Committee proposed approval of Commissioner Aspen to serve as Commission Chair from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

Commissioner Garman, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, moved to approve Commissioner Aspen to serve as Commission Chair from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022. A roll call vote was taken with all eight Commissioners present voting yes.

The Nominating Committee proposed approval of Commissioner Bernthal to continue to serve as Vice Chair from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

Commissioner Garman, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, moved to approve Commissioner Bernthal to serve as Commission Vice Chair from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022. A roll call vote was taken with all eight Commissioners present voting yes.

The Nominating Committee proposed approval of Commissioners Von Behren and Adam to serve on the Executive Committee along with the Chair and Vice Chair from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

Commissioner Garman, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, moved to approve Commissioners Von Behren and Adam to serve on the Executive Committee, along with the Chair and Vice Chair, from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022. A roll call vote was taken with all eight Commissioners present voting yes.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dr. Baumgartner introduced Dzenisa Burnic, the new Administrative Assistant at the CCPE office. Ms. Burnic is a UNL graduate and recently relocated to Lincoln from Iowa with her husband.

Dr. Baumgartner asked Gary Timm, Chief Finance & Administrative Officer, to present the Third Quarter Budget Report. Mr. Timm reported that 64 percent had been spent from the administrative funds as of March 31. Mr. Timm spoke briefly on the status of the Nebraska Opportunity Grant (NOG), Community College Gap Assistance Program, and the Access College Early Scholarship (ACE) appropriations and allocations.

Dr. Baumgartner spoke on capital bills, higher education appropriations and legislative bills of interest Dr. Baumgartner provided handouts on 2021 capital bills, higher education appropriations for 2021-2023, and legislative bills of interest to the CCPE. The legislature concluded its work on the budget April 20, and Governor Ricketts approved it the next week. The budget is good for higher education in Nebraska, as the appropriations are increasing around 3 percent each year. Dr. Baumgartner noted the budget fully funds our ACE request for an additional \$150,000 for FY2022 and \$250,000 for FY2023. It also fully funds our NOG request with \$2 million additional for FY2023.

Dr. Baumgartner said in terms of capital projects, the major outcome is the increase to and extension of the University of Nebraska Facilities Program to 2062, the creation of a renewal, replacement, and repair fund; and the extension of the State College System's facilities program to 2040.

Dr. Baumgartner reported that LB529, which would have changed the distribution of lottery funds for the next five years, did not move forward. That bill would have created a new Door to College Scholarship program and Dual Credit Teacher Grant, both administered by the Commission, and transferred the Excellence in Teaching Act from the Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) to the Commission. Dr. Baumgartner noted that LB528, a "clean-up" bill to fix old statutory language that also included the extension of the Gap program to the Tribal Colleges, was expected to pass. This bill will keep the NOG program's distribution of lottery funds at 62 percent and the Gap program's distribution at 9 percent for the next three fiscal years.

Dr. Baumgartner to co-chair Nebraska Tech Collaborative Higher Education Committee Dr. Baumgartner stated he accepted an offer to be the co-chair of the Nebraska Tech Collaborative Higher Education Committee. The collaborative has seven committees, and the higher education committee meets monthly, with goals of adding 10,000 tech workers in Nebraska by 2025, improving diversity of the tech workforce, creating start-ups, and making Nebraska known as a tech destination.

Dr. Baumgartner reported on recent meetings and activities he has been involved in

Dr. Baumgartner noted that on March 31 and May 19, he participated in the Fostering Achievement in Nebraska Academic Preparation Working Group. On May 7 he attended the Aksarben Stakeholders Meeting, and he has been involved in conversations with NDE, the University, state colleges, and community colleges on a statewide e-Transcript opportunity with Parchment. Parchment has a contract with the Midwestern Higher Education Compact, allowing its member states to take advantage of favorable pricing.

Dr. Baumgartner spoke on staff meetings and activities

Dr. Baumgartner reported that several staff members have recently attended virtual meetings. Jill Heese, Research Coordinator, attended the SHEEO Research and Data group meeting and the UNO CPAR Data Conference. Dr. Kathleen Fimple, Academic Programs Officer, attended National and Midwest SARA meetings, MHEC Dual Enrollment Teachers Meeting, and along with Chair Frison and Dr. Baumgartner, participated in the MHEC-wide Credential Engine online convening. Gary Timm and

Dr. Fimple have been meeting with the community colleges to finalize the credit and non-credit master course lists, which provide the basis for the audits that drive the community college funding formula.

Dr. David Jackson, Vice Provost at the University of Nebraska, testified that a number of representatives from the University system were present and available to discuss the programs on the agenda.

Dr. Susan Fritz, Executive Vice President and Provost at the University of Nebraska, spoke via Zoom on undergraduate certificates.

Chair Frison closed the public hearing on Academic Programs Committee Items.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

Commissioner Adam, Committee Chair, acknowledged committee members who recently met to discuss the eight academic action items on the agenda.

<u>Southeast Community College - Proposal for an Off-Campus Center</u> <u>with a Long-Term Commitment - Nebraska City</u>

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Commissioner Adam stated the current leased facility in Nebraska City has 2,500 square feet of space with no appropriate areas for large classes, student services, health sciences, or parking, and raises security and accessibility issues. Nebraska City Public Schools offered to sell one of its buildings to SCC. It has 12,500 square feet, 9,000 of which have been remodeled into classrooms, office space, study areas, and a construction lab. Dr. Fimple added that there is 3,500 square feet of shell space that would be used to develop health science labs with a portion reserved for future expansion.

Mr. Morgan stated that the current space is inadequate for the majority of offerings demanded by the community and this has been a golden opportunity for SCC and the Nebraska City community.

<u>University of Nebraska-Lincoln - Proposal for a New Instructional</u>
<u>Program - Animal Science Management Undergraduate Certificate</u>
Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Dr. Fimple stated that this proposal is designed for students who have an interest in working in the animal science industry but who do not want to major in animal science. The 18-credit hour program allows students to choose courses from a list of animal science classes in order to address their specific area of interest.

Dr. Tiffany Heng-Moss, Dean, College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, stated this program is an innovative way to serve students and life-long learners in a creative way and be a model for other states. To get the word out about this program and others, *NU Online* is used as a broad visibility marketing platform. Dr. Fimple thanked Dr. Lisa Karr, Animal Science Department Undergraduate Teaching Coordinator and Companion Animal Specialist at UNL, for being present via Zoom.

Commissioner Adam stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Undergraduate Certificate in Animal Science Management at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The program meets the statutory requirement of having the preponderance of courses above the associate degree level (a minimum of 10 out of 18).

Commissioner Adam, on behalf of the Academic Programs
Committee, moved to approve the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's
Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Animal Science
Management Undergraduate Certificate. A roll call vote was taken.
All eight Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

University of Nebraska-Lincoln - Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Bachelor of Science in Plant and Landscape Systems

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Dr. Fimple noted this program was the result of an external review, with the recommendation to streamline majors and create a degree along with options that attract broader audiences with a flexible curriculum. The existing three programs in Horticulture (BS), Agronomy (BS), and Turfgrass and Landscape Management (BS) will move into one degree with four options and a selection of specializations. The partnership with

Dr. Martha Mamo, Department Head, Department of Agronomy and Horticulture; and John E. Weaver, Professor of Agronomy and Horticulture at UNL, joined the meeting via Zoom. Dr. Mamo and Dr. Heng-Moss answered questions from Commissioners.

Commissioner Adam stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Bachelor of Science in Plant and Landscape Systems at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Commissioner Adam, on behalf of the Academic Programs
Committee, moved to approve the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's
Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Bachelor of Science in
Plant and Landscape Systems. A roll call vote was taken. All eight
Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

<u>University of Nebraska-Lincoln - Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in Law and Business</u>

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Dr. Fimple stated the proposed program is a joint effort between the College of Business and the College of Law to award a BSBA degree which would provide students with legal knowledge and critical thinking skills. The program would require 41 credit hours in business as well as four law courses currently required for the existing minor in law and business and a fifth law course in negotiation and conflict management.

There was extensive discussion regarding calling the program *law and business* and not *legal studies* or *business and law*. Dr. Donna Dudney, Associate Dean of Undergraduate Curriculum and Programs, and Associate Professor of Finance at the College of Business from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, discussed the proposed program, and along with Professor Colleen Medill, Robert and Joanne Berkshire Family Professor of Law, College of Law, via Zoom, answered Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner Adam made a motion in lieu of the Committee recommendation to approve the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in Law and Business with the hosting institution's suggestion, after discussion, to consider offering the program with a name change to Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in Business and Law. Commissioner Daniels seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Commissioner Garman voted no. The remaining seven Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Dr. Fimple stated this would be a joint effort between the College of Pharmacy at UNMC and the Department of Chemistry at UNO. The degree would provide for students who do not want to be a pharmacist but rather have a pharmacy background to help them in their chosen field, for example as a pharmaceutical sales representative or research technician. This is an in-person program with no other free-standing program like it in the region.

Dr. David Boocker, Dean, UNO College of Arts and Sciences and Dr. LaReesa Wolfenbarger, Associate Dean for Science and Research, UNO College of Arts and Sciences (via Zoom), along with Dr. Jackson, discussed the program and answered Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner Adam stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Bachelor of Science in Pharmaceutical Sciences at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Commissioner Adam, on behalf of the Academic Programs
Committee, moved to approve the University of Nebraska at
Omaha's Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Bachelor of
Science in Pharmaceutical Sciences. A roll call vote was taken. All
eight Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

University of Nebraska Medical Center Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Master of Science in Biostatistics

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Dr. Fimple stated that the Commission approved a PhD in Biostatistics at UNMC in 2012. The program had not produced any graduates in 2019, so an indepth review was conducted. UNMC produced a very thorough analysis with suggestions for improving enrollments and graduation rates. In the analysis it was noted that there was not a master's degree in biostatistics to feed into the doctoral program. The Commission continued the program with a report on graduates and enrollments due July 15, 2022.

Dr. Christopher Wichman, Assistant Professor, UNMC Department of Biostatistics, mentioned that there will be a total of four graduates by August in the PhD program. He also discussed the median salary for a statistician in several different fields.

Commissioner Adam stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Master of Science degree in Biostatistics at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Biomedical informatics is a collection of disciplines that include bioinformatics, systems biology, and health, clinical and bioimaging informatics. The center would be a virtual one jointly administered by UNO Peter Kiewit Institute and UNMC Durham Research Center. Dr. Fimple added that the proposal included anticipated goals and outcomes for the center.

Dr. Ann Fruhling, Charles W. and Margre H. Durham Distinguished Professor, College of Information Science and Technology from UNO, spoke on the advisory committees and boards that would administer the center.

Commissioner Adam stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Center for Biomedical Informatics Research and Innovation at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

Commissioner Adam, on behalf of the Academic Programs
Committee, moved to approve the University of Nebraska Medical
Center's Proposal for a New Organizational Unit - Center for
Biomedical Informatics Research and Innovation. A roll call vote
was taken. All eight Commissioners present voted yes. The motion
carried.

<u>University of Nebraska at Omaha - Proposal for a New</u> <u>Organizational Unit - Samuel Bak Academic Learning Center</u>

Commissioner Adam and Dr. Fimple presented the proposal. Commissioner Adam stated that the center would build upon many existing programs and expand academic curricula and community engagement along with educational activities dedicated to genocide studies, the Holocaust, human rights, and artistic works. Dr. Fimple added that the center would provide an organizational structure and attract external funding.

Dr. Jackson stated the center would need to exist in order to house the gift of Mr. Bak's artwork valued at \$18 million. Dr. Boocker and Dr. Mark Celinscak, Louis and Frances Blumkin Professor of Holocaust and Genocide Studies, UNO Department of History, provided information on Samuel Bak's background and works and answered Commissioner's questions.

Dr. Baumgartner provided an amended version of the proposed operating budget to the Commissioners, stating that it is different from what was in the agenda booklet and recommended by the Executive Committee. The amended version removes all of the new proposed programs and additional ACE funding from the lottery -- the Career Readiness Teacher's Dual Credit Grant, the Excellence in Teaching Act, the Door to College Scholarship, and the ACE Plus program -- as LB529 and LB293 did not pass in the legislature. Dr. Baumgartner gave a brief overview of the administrative budget portion of the budget, noting it has not changed and reflects what was presented to the legislature in the fall. He provided a brief summary of the Nebraska Opportunity Grant (NOG), Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship, Gap Tuition Assistance Program, and Guaranty Recovery Fund. He requested the Commission consider approval of the amended operating budget.

Chair Frison asked for a motion to approve the Amended Proposed Operating Budget FYE June 30, 2022, noting a motion and second is required.

Commissioner Adam made a motion to approve the Amended Proposed Operating Budget Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2022. Commissioner Garman seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. All eight Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

Introduction

Mission College of Health Sciences is a subsidiary of Global Education Ministries Foundation. The Foundation was incorporated in 2019 in the state of Ohio. The specific mission of the foundation is to provide support for people wanting to help disadvantaged communities through the promotion of education. This is accomplished by numerous activities including providing scholarships to missionaries, supporting schools and educators in impoverished areas, and working with communities to develop education infrastructure.

Mission College proposes to offer an online RN to BSN program. The college has begun the process to become accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). It is also seeking accreditation from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN), a national nursing accreditor recognized by the U.S. Department of Education.

This application is for authorization to establish an administrative office in Nebraska. Even if instruction is provided online, Nebraska statues require an institution to seek approval from the Coordinating Commission for an administrative office located within the state.

REVIEW CRITERIA

A. The financial soundness of the institution and its capability to fulfill its proposed commitments and sustain its operations (and the tuition refund policy for an institution that does not participate in federal financial aid programs described in Title IV of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965...as such act existed on January 1, 2011)

Mission College is a new institution and as such, no prior financial statements are available. The Global Education Ministries Foundation was

recently established with James Hauschlidt, Mission College's chief executive officer, as the CEO and statutory agent for the foundation. The application states that the college is a subsidiary of the foundation.

Revenue – The five-year budget for the college includes a \$500,000 gift from the foundation in the first year's revenue stream. The budget anticipates steady tuition growth through enrollment increases. The budget also projects that at the end of the first five years revenue will have exceeded expenses by \$1.9 million. This projection is predicated on Mission College meeting its enrollment targets. In response to the Commission's question on plans for the funds, the college stated that the funds would be used to build endowment for faculty development, student scholarships, technology, program development, and student services.

Expenses –The college projects limited expense growth due to the online nature of instruction and the use of a limited number of instructors. If Mission College's expenses exceed its revenue, the college reports that, as a subsidiary of the foundation, it would be provided a "gift" from the foundation for any additional funding needed.

Financial Aid Policy – The school does not intend to participate in the federal Title IV financial aid program. Financial aid procedures, including refund policies, are identified in the college's 2021-2022 Academic Programs Catalog. The primary source of student tuition would be through workplace educational reimbursement payments or scholarships. The college states that it would provide flexible payment options if needed to eliminate students needing to take out student loans.

Student Loan Default Rate and Composite Financial Score—not applicable

The U.S. Department of Education requires institutions participating in Title IV programs to satisfy financial responsibility standards and to maintain a specific default rate. Mission College does not intend to participate in the Title IV program.

Tuition – The tuition for the BSN program is \$455 per credit hour. That price includes all fees and books. If general education classes are needed, the tuition is \$340. The table below shows that the rate is lower than other nursing programs in the Omaha area with the exception of the \$378 per credit hour resident tuition at UNMC (see Section B. for a list of all institutions).

Financial Soundness – Provided the budget for Mission College is reasonable and the college can meet its enrollment goals, it appears the college would be financially stable.

B. The quality of the programs offered, including courses, programs of instruction, degrees, any necessary clinical placements, and the institution's ability to generate and sustain enrollment

Curriculum- The program is a cohort-based, online baccalaureate degree completion program for current registered nurses. The program is faith-based and service-oriented. Students must have graduated from a diploma

or associate's degree program. If the student has not taken at least 60 credit hours of prerequisite courses (a typical number of hours for an associate degree), Mission College will provide the additional courses needed.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing requires 120 semester credit hours. Since students must already have nursing education to be admitted, the college will count 50 to 60 credits (depending on the previously completed curriculum) toward the degree. The college will also grant 40 credit hours of experiential learning for students who hold a valid nursing license and who have verified employment. The remaining 20 credit hours are all in nursing and reflect the faith-based focus of the college (e.g., Ministry in Healthcare; Spiritual Dimensions of Nursing Leadership). The 20 credit hours include a capstone course that focuses on research or a 10-day healthcare mission.

The admissions requirements and curriculum, including the practice of awarding substantial credit for prior education and experience, is typical of RN to BSN programs.

As a degree completion program, no clinical placements would be needed since students would have participated in those experiences when working toward their RN.

BSN degrees are available at nine institutions in Nebraska: UNMC, Bryan College of Health Sciences, Clarkson College, College of St. Mary, Creighton University, Nebraska Methodist College, Midland University, Union College, and Nebraska Wesleyan University. The UNMC program is available on the UNK campus, Bryan plans to begin offering its program in Hastings, and Creighton is partnering with York College for a 3+1 program. Altogether, these nine institutions have averaged 1,109 graduates per year over the past five years, but it is not enough to meet the needs of the state.

While there is a nursing shortage in Nebraska, this program would not add to the number of nurses since students must be an RN to be admitted and many could be located in another state. It would, however, expand the number of nurses holding a baccalaureate degree that is often in demand by employers. The degree to which this would benefit Nebraska depends on the location of the students.

Enrollment – Mission College intends to keep class sizes small, a practice that would benefit students and provide for a manageable number of students on a mission trip. The college estimates that 25 students would enroll in the first cohort, with enrollment more than doubling by year five. The application didn't provide a rationale for the initial enrollment numbers. Growth was extrapolated based on "typical demand."

Credit – Each credit hour is equivalent to one contact hour over a 16-week semester.

C. The quality and adequacy of teaching faculty, library services, and support services

Faculty – Experienced adjunct faculty with appropriate credentials will be hired to teach nursing and general education courses.

The CEO of Mission College holds an EdD in Curriculum and Instruction, an MSN in Organizational Leadership (Nursing), and an MA in Business Administration/Management (Human Resources/Information Systems). He is also a licensed registered nurse and would be available to teach nursing and business courses if needed.

Library and Support Services – The college will use online journals for library services through Google Education Suite and Amazon for Business. Students would also be encouraged to utilize their employer's library resources or a local library.

Academic and career advising will be provided by course faculty, the College Placement Office, and technology systems that support recruitment and career advancement.

D. The specific locations where programs will be offered or planned locations and a demonstration that facilities are adequate at the locations for the programs to be offered

No evaluation of the facility is needed. The administrative office would be located in a non-public space in mid-town Omaha.

E. Whether such institution and, when appropriate, the programs, are fully accredited, or seeking accreditation, by an accrediting body recognized by the United States Department of Education

Mission College began the accreditation process with the Higher Learning Commission in May 2021. The college is also seeking accreditation from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing. Both accreditors are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and require an institution to have graduated one cohort of students before granting full accreditation.

Approval from the Nebraska Board of Nursing is required only for LPN and RN programs, so Mission College would not need the Board's approval.

F. Assurances regarding transfer of credits earned in the program to the main campus of such institution [if applicable] and clear and accurate representations about the transferability of credits to other institutions located in Nebraska and elsewhere

Credits from this program could transfer to any institution that accepts transfer credits according to the institution's policy. Acceptance of any transfer credits is always up to the receiving institution.

G. The institution's policies and procedures related to students, including, but not limited to, recruiting and admissions practices

The admission requirements for the program include a prior associate's degree in nursing or nursing diploma from an accredited school or college, a current nursing license, and active employment (or an agreement to complete a mission trip to satisfy the clinical requirement in lieu of employment).

Should Mission College discontinue offerings, the college would teach out remaining students or find suitable transfer or articulating institutions.



College Course Offerings for High School Students Highlights of the Report

2019-2020

Since the early 1990s, the Commission has reported on courses offered at distance by public institutions for students in Nebraska. Information on instruction for high school students was not initially collected; it was added in 1998-99. Due to the number and ubiquity of distance courses overall, as well as the importance of making college courses available to high school students, the Commission has chosen to collect information solely on distance courses offered for high school students.

Distance education enrollment information for fall 2012 through fall 2019 for all Nebraska institutions by student level, distance education status, and distance education location can be found on the Coordinating Commission's enrollment dashboard at ccpe.nebraska.gov/enrollment-dashboard.

Definitions

- Course Delivery Method
 - Traditional delivery—instructor and students are in the same time and place away from the campus; for example, a face-to-face class in a different town or a location in the community other than the campus.
 - Synchronous delivery—instructor and students are in the same time, but not the same place; for example, two-way interactive video, where the instructor is in one location, often on the campus with students in a classroom, and delivers the course at the same time by video to other students at a "receiving" site or sites.
 - Asynchronous delivery—instructor and students are in a different time and place; for example, an online course where students work on their own and there is no specified time for the class as a whole to have contact with the instructor.
- Dual or concurrent enrollment
 - The courses counted in this report are frequently offered for both high school and college credit and are usually called "dual enrollment" or "dual credit" courses in Nebraska. Also included in this report are college courses offered in high schools for which students receive only college credit although they are still enrolled in high school. These are sometimes called "concurrent enrollment" courses. Students who live near a college campus or who elect to take an online course can also earn college credit. These students are not generally counted separately and, therefore, most are not reflected in the high school data presented here.

- While the majority of dual credit courses are offered in high schools, there are three exceptions in the reported data: MCC, NECC, and SCC included courses that were taught on a campus or center.
 - MCC reported 16 courses at the Fremont Center, serving 364 students.
 - NECC reported 47 students attending 14 courses at the O'Neill Extended Campus, 166 students attending 33 courses at the West Point Extended Campus, 114 students in 20 courses at the College Center in South Sioux City, and 212 students in 31 courses on the Norfolk campus. The main campus courses were included because the entire course was for dual credit and could be easily identified. In addition, the majority of courses in Norfolk required specialized facilities or equipment, such as welding, allied health, and agriculture that may not have been available at a high school or other location.
 - SCC included 179 courses provided at The Career Academy (TCA), a facility attached to the SCC Lincoln campus serving students in Lincoln Public Schools. The college reported 2,089 dual credit students at TCA in 2019-20.

Numbers of Courses and Students

- All six community colleges, the three state colleges, and the University of Nebraska campuses (except for UNMC) offered courses to high school students in 2019-20 and for the two years prior (Table I).
- In 2017-18 there were 3,119 college courses enrolling 33,578 high school students (duplicated headcount). The number of courses and students in 2018-19 were higher, and the 2019-20 figures were greater yet.
- The number of courses offered in the university sector increased between 2017-18 and 2019-20, with a dip in 2018-19. The number
 of students served decreased over the three years despite a large increase in the number of courses at UNO.
- At the state colleges both the number of courses offered and the number of students served increased from 2017-18 to 2019-20, with a dip in 2018-19.
- At the community colleges, the number of students served as well as the number of courses increased from 2017-18 to 2019-20.
- Since the reporting period for the current data is the academic year 2019-20 (ending with spring 2020), it is unlikely that the COVID-19 pandemic had any significant impact on the figures.

Distribution by Sector

The distribution of both courses and students changed little from 2018-19 to 2019-20. The university's courses represented a larger percentage in 2019-20 than in the previous year, but the number of students was smaller. The opposite was true for the community colleges, i.e., a smaller percent of courses serving a large percentage of students. See table below.

- Prior to 2015, the largest number of courses and students was reported by UNO. Much of UNO's success can be attributed to a partnership between UNO and the Omaha area high schools by which UNO faculty work with high school faculty so that Advanced Placement (AP) courses taught in high schools meet UNO requirements and are accepted for college credit.
- However, in 2015-16 the pattern began to change, with some of the community colleges exceeding UNO's numbers. In 2019-20 CCC, MCC, and SCC all offered more courses than UNO and also exceeded the number of students reported by UNO.

Delivery Methods

The method of delivery varies significantly both by sector and by institution (Table II).

- For distance education delivered to <u>all</u> students (not just high school students), asynchronous delivery is by far the most popular in all three sectors, while synchronous is the least-used. For offerings to high school students, however, traditional delivery is most common. Since the Commission began collecting high school data, synchronous delivery has been the second most common and asynchronous the least. In 2017-18, however, asynchronous delivery surpassed synchronous, a pattern that continued through 2019-20 with the difference between the delivery types growing.
- Synchronous delivery was previously used heavily by the community colleges due, in part, to dual enrollment courses offered to high school students at their high school building. Improving the ability of colleges to offer synchronous courses to K-12 schools was the goal of LB 1208, passed in 2006. The bill provided for improvement in connectivity state-wide and offered incentives for K-12 schools to participate in distance delivery.
- LB 1208 did greatly improve connectivity in the state but did not result in a significant increase in the number of synchronous courses offered by the community colleges. In all three years shown on Table II, five of the six community colleges and PSC in 2019-20 were the only institutions reporting synchronous delivery for high school students.
- The state colleges previously offered dual credit courses relying heavily on traditional delivery, with a few courses offered asynchronously. In 2018-19 all three institutions reported courses utilizing solely traditional delivery with the exception of 17 asynchronous courses at PSC. In 2019-20 however, PSC also offered both synchronous and asynchronous and CSC and WSC provided asynchronous.
- Similarly, UNO and UNK offered all of their dual credit courses traditionally. NCTA offered their dual credit entirely as asynchronous courses, while UNL offered both asynchronous and traditional courses in 2019-20.

Subject areas

Almost every type of course is offered at distance to high school students. Table III identifies the disciplines in which the courses were offered.

- Of special note is the tradition of the community colleges to report the vast majority of their academic transfer courses (e.g., English, science, math, and social science) under Liberal Arts and Sciences (CIP 24), which therefore represents a wide range of courses.
 This tradition results in Liberal Arts and Sciences being the discipline with the most offered courses. In 2019-20 NECC deviated from this practice, reporting all of their academic transfer courses in the associated CIP. None were reported in CIP 24 (see table IV).
- Liberal arts and sciences courses are also the kinds typically offered by the four-year institutions. The most-offered courses in the state college sector were in math and English language and literature. At the university they were math and social science. It is logical that these courses would be popular for dual credit offerings as they are often courses that fulfill general education requirements at both two-year and four-year institutions. They are also the courses most likely to be accepted in transfer from one institution to another.
- Beyond the liberal arts and sciences courses, the community colleges focused on the technical and career training that is primary in their role and mission e.g., CIPS 48 and 51.
- Table IV shows the course offerings by institution within the community college sector—the sector providing the largest number of
 courses. With the exception of MPCC, all the colleges offered courses in at least a dozen different fields. After liberal arts and
 sciences the largest number of courses was in precision production, offered at all six institutions. Health professions courses were
 offered at all the colleges except MPCC. Business, information sciences, engineering technology, and mechanic /repair courses were
 also available from all six colleges.

Accessibility

Accessibility is often thought of in terms of location. Students in rural areas, for example, may not have courses provided at their high school due to the remote location. However, students should also have access to a *variety* of courses. For example, if English Comp I is offered every semester but English Comp II is rarely or never offered, the student is not able to take full advantage of dual enrollment.

Accessibility: Course Variety

- Table V is a summary of all courses offered by all institutions more than 10 times in 2019-20. Eleven courses were offered at least 20 times at one institution and also offered by at least one additional institution. This is three more than in 2018-19. The new courses were Analytic Geometry/Calculus I, American Government, and Late American History (also called U.S. History Since 1865 and American History II).
- As in 2018-19, English Comp I was offered most often in 2019-20 followed by College Algebra (Table VI).
- The number of English Comp II courses almost doubled from 2018-19 to 2019-20. Applied Statistics courses also increased significantly.
- Within the list of courses offered more than 10 times there is a wide variety of topics, ranging from financial literacy to medical terminology (right-hand columns of Table V). Most popular were Intro to Literature, Biology, and Welding (GMAW and SMAW).

Accessibility: Course Location

 Asynchronous courses can be accessed from almost any location across the state. Therefore, the institutions do not usually report locations for students taking courses asynchronously.

- Table VII lists the locations reported by the institutions. The state is well covered, especially when low-population areas are taken into consideration. Simply as a means to organize the data, the locations are grouped by community college area. Courses offered at a location within the community college area are enumerated by the sector offering the course. Because institutions may offer courses outside their geographic service area (with permission from the Coordinating Commission), a number in any of the columns does not necessarily mean that the closest institution provided all of the courses.
- Students in the state's larger cities naturally have more opportunity for dual enrollment courses.
 - 130 courses were offered at Grand Island High School, 109 at North Platte High School, 173 at Fremont High School, and 137 at Scottsbluff High School.
 - The 109 courses at North Platte represent 43% of all dual credit courses offered by MPCC. The 137 courses at Scottsbluff are 47% of WNCC's dual credit courses, a result of the vigorous career academy program at Scottsbluff High School.
 - In addition to the courses at the various high schools in Lincoln, Southeast Community College offered 179 courses at The Career Academy in partnership with Lincoln Public Schools.
 - The large number of courses available in Omaha does not appear as a single figure because the institutions report for all the individual public and private high schools in the Omaha metro area. If totaled, there would be well over 900 courses in the immediate metro area, with additional courses in communities outside the metro.
- Small communities, of course, have fewer opportunities, but the institutions do reach them. Towns such as Wynot (population 170), Potter (population 331), Leigh (population 403), and Arthur (population 117) each had at least two courses offered in 2019-20.
- What Tables V, VI, and VII do not show is which courses were offered in the locations. For example, a location may show four courses. That could represent four different courses, one course offered four times, or some combination of offerings.

State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (SARA) April 2021 Report


In 2013, the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA) became a nationwide coordinating entity, in partnership with the country's four regional education compacts (NEBHE, MHEC, SREB, and WICHE). Its purpose is to establish uniform standards and procedures for state oversight of postsecondary distance education delivered across state lines. States join SARA and agree to vet institutions in their state that wish to participate in SARA. Participating institutions can then offer distance education in other SARA states without additional state approval.

As of January 2021, 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands were members of SARA, and 2,200 institutions were participating in SARA. California is the only state that has not joined SARA.

Percent of Total Institutions



More New Reporting

- From the beginning, SARA has allowed SARA institutions to place students in experiential learning situations (with some restrictions) in other SARA states. Placements include such activities as rotations, internships, clinicals, and student teaching, and are not necessarily tied to instruction delivered entirely on-ground by the institution.
- The policy attracted many institutions in just such a position, i.e., only on-ground instruction but with students in experiential placements in other states. Consequently, there are institutions participating in SARA who do not conduct any of their instruction at distance.
- To capture information about the extent of experiential placements, starting in spring 2019
 institutions participating in SARA were required to report the numbers of their students engaged
 in experiential learning placements, disaggregated by state and two-digit CIP (Classification of
 Instructional Programs used by the National Center for Education Statistics). This followed a
 voluntary pilot year in 2018. The numbers collected include institutions who provide distance
 instruction as well as those who don't.
- This collection proved extremely challenging for many institutions, so figures should not be considered definitive.

- Nationally, CIP 51 (Health Professions) accounted for almost 53% of placements. Education (CIP 13) accounted for almost 11% of placements and Business (CIP 52) placements were nearly 6% of all placements. These were also the top three CIPs reported in 2018, although the percentages in 2019 were lower than in 2018. This is likely due to institutions improving their ability to track placements in other fields.
- Health and Education were the top two CIPs in Nebraska for both years. The most notable difference between the two years is that the percentage in Health Professions increased from 2018 to 2019.
- NC-SARA expected the number of out-of-state enrollments reported to rise significantly after 2018 as institutions refined their mechanisms for gathering this type of information. This proved true, as there was a 45.8% increase in the number of placements reported in 2019.










- Between 2009-10 and 2019-20, the number of degrees and other awards conferred increased at all award levels except for associate's degrees.
- The highest rate of growth between 2008-09 and 2018-19 was at the doctor's level (29.8%). Nearly half of the increase in doctoral degrees was due to a 30.6% increase in these awards at Creighton University.



- Nebraska's public and nonpublic institutions awarded 16,971 degrees and other awards to women in 2019-20, an increase of 10.2% over the 10-year period from 2009-10 to 2019-20. The largest 10-year percentage increase for awards granted to females was seen at the doctoral degree level (36.2%).
- Meanwhile, 13,200 degrees and other awards were granted to men in 2019-20, an increase of 11.4% since 2009-10. The largest 10-year percentage increase for awards granted to males was seen at the less-than-four-year certificate level (73.2%).

• Nebraska institutions conferred 29,068 awards to nonresident aliens and students of known race/ethnicity in 2019-20. As shown in the table below, the number of awards conferred to nonresident aliens nearly tripled while the number of awards conferred to Hispanics increased 174.1%.

- Nebraska's postsecondary institutions confer large numbers of degrees and other awards in Business and Communication;
 Health; and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM). Together, these discipline clusters accounted for 58.0% of awards conferred in 2019-20.
- As shown in the table below, the largest 10-year percentage increase, 40.9%, was evidenced within the STEM discipline cluster, while the smallest 10-year percentage increase, 1.5%, was evidenced within the Business and Communication discipline cluster.







- Section 6 of this report examines the number of completers by age group. Note that since age group data has only been collected since 2011-12, 10-year trends are not available.
- In 2011-12, 46.0% of completers were 24 years of age or younger, 41.3% were 25-39 years, and 12.6% were 40 years or older.
- In 2019-20, 51.2% of completers were 24 years of age or younger, 38.0% were 25-39 years, and 10.8% were 40 years or older.
- As shown in the graph below, the majority of undergraduate completers in 2019-20 were 24 years or younger while the majority
 of graduate completers were 25-39 years of age.

Introduction Degrees and Other Awards Conferred 2009-2010 through 2019-2020

The 2021 Factual Look at Higher Education in Nebraska summarizes information from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) survey forms. The Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, requires institutions that participate in federal student aid programs to submit data to IPEDS.¹

The Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education is responsible for verification and reporting of IPEDS data as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1424, which states:

"The commission shall:

- (1) Review and verify all information submitted by public postsecondary systems and institutions as part of the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System and make such corrections in the submitted information as are necessary; and
- (2) Prepare and disseminate an annual report of the information submitted by each public postsecondary system and institution and those private postsecondary educational institutions willing to cooperate as part of the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System."

The annual report consists of two sections—Degrees and Other Awards Conferred, and Enrollment—and each section is approved and disseminated as it is completed. This section of the *Factual Look* summarizes the number of degrees and awards reported through IPEDS surveys of Nebraska's public and nonpublic colleges and universities.

Institutions report the number of degrees and other awards conferred during a one-year period beginning on July 1. For example, degrees and awards reported for 2019-20 were awarded between July 1, 2019, and June 30, 2020. The 10-year trends presented in this section of the *Factual Look* are based on the Fall 2010 through Fall 2020 IPEDS Completion surveys of Nebraska's public and nonpublic colleges. Through these surveys, Nebraska institutions reported the number of degrees, certificates, and diplomas awarded from 2009-10 through 2019-20. In this report, the number of degrees and other awards conferred is analyzed by (1) sector and institution, (2) award level, (3) gender, (4) race/ethnicity, and (5) discipline cluster. In addition, the number of completers by age is summarized in section six of this report.

Throughout this report, the total number of degrees and other awards is analyzed by four sectors of higher education in Nebraska. As defined in the Coordinating Commission's *Comprehensive Statewide Plan for Postsecondary Education*, there are three public sectors of higher education in Nebraska:

¹ A few nonpublic institutions are not included in this analysis because: 1.) The institution is not required to report school statistics to IPEDS, or 2.) The institution reports school statistics to IPEDS, but it has campuses in multiple states and reports combined data for multiple campuses (known as "parent/child" reporting).



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<u>University of Nebraska</u>: "The University of Nebraska provides extensive, comprehensive postsecondary education to Nebraska citizens through its four campuses: the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the University of Nebraska at Omaha, the University of Nebraska at Kearney, and the University of Nebraska Medical Center. The two-year Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture, under the management of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at UNL, is also part of the University of Nebraska system."²


<u>Nebraska State College System</u>: "The state colleges at Chadron, Peru, and Wayne are regional institutions that provide educational programs and public services to meet needs indigenous to their service areas."

<u>Nebraska Community Colleges</u>: "Community colleges provide educational options for students seeking entry-level career training. The education program may culminate in an applied technology associate degree, diploma, or certificate; or an associate of arts or associate of science degree from an academic transfer program." Nebraska's six public community colleges are: Central, Metropolitan, Mid-Plains, Northeast, Southeast, and Western Nebraska.

In addition to the public colleges and universities, private not-for-profit, private for-profit, out-of-state public, and federally-funded tribal colleges submit data to IPEDS and are categorized as <u>Nonpublic Colleges and Universities</u>. Several institutions in this sector no longer report to IPEDS due to school closings and institutional changes.


² The numbers of degrees reported include degrees conferred by the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) to graduates of the physician assistant military and distance education programs. These programs serve all branches of the military and most graduates are not residents of Nebraska. For technical reasons, UNMC did not report these students via the IPEDS Completion surveys for 2009-10 through 2011-12. UNMC began reporting distance education completions in the 2012-13 IPEDS Completion surveys; however, physician assistant military completions are not reported. To ensure the *Factual Look* accurately portrays UNMC's completions, the Commission includes the physician assistant military degrees and distance education degrees in the *Degrees and Other Awards Conferred* section of the *Factual Look*. Unfortunately, the Commission is not able to determine UNMC's enrollment counts for these programs. Therefore, the *Enrollment* section of the *Factual Look* does not include students in the aforementioned programs. The number of degrees added to UNMC's IPEDS completion totals are as follows: 661 (2009-10), 627 (2010-11), 558 (2011-12), 311 (2012-13), 344 (2013-14), 348 (2014-15), 330 (2015-16), 334 (2016-17), 358 (2017-18), 353 (2018-19), and 364 (2019-20).





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


Total Degrees and Other Awards by Sector and by Institution








- Nebraska's postsecondary institutions conferred a total of 30,171 degrees, diplomas, and certificates during the one-year period from July 1, 2019, to June 30, 2020, a decrease of 1,245 awards, or 4.0%, from one year earlier.
- Over the 10-year period from 2009-10 to 2019-20, the total number of degrees and awards conferred by postsecondary institutions in Nebraska increased 10.8%.






TOTAL DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by SECTOR









DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA








DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY THE NEBRASKA STATE COLLEGE SYSTEM





DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY NEBRASKA NONPUBLIC INSTITUTIONS







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

Total Degrees and Other Awards by Award Level






CLASSIFICATION OF DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS

The analyses in this section focus on the total number of degrees and other awards by level as defined below.

"Award levels are identified on the basis of recognition for their completion, duration, or a combination thereof. Degree-designated award levels indicate those degree levels for which the institution is authorized to offer recognized postsecondary credentials. Length of study is the equivalent of the number of full-time academic years. For example, at least one but less than two years refers to the number of credits or the course load that would normally be completed by a full-time student attending within the stated time period." (Data source: IPEDS Glossary)




DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA by AWARD LEVEL










DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY NEBRASKA COMMUNITY COLLEGES by AWARD LEVEL






DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED BY NEBRASKA NONPUBLIC INSTITUTIONS by AWARD LEVEL










DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by AWARD LEVEL by SECTOR




DOCTOR'S DEGREES AWARDED by CLASSIFICATION by SECTOR



- Research/scholarship doctoral degrees increased 45.6% between 2009-10 and 2019-20:
 - 28.8% increase at the University of Nebraska (from 309 to 398)
 - 224.1% increase at Nebraska's nonpublic institutions (from 29 to 94)
- Professional practice doctoral degrees increased 10.1% during this same time:
 - 0.5% decrease at the University of Nebraska (from 441 to 439)
 - 17.6% increase at Nebraska's nonpublic institutions (from 613 to 721)




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
Total Degrees and Other Awards by Gender








- Nebraska's postsecondary institutions awarded 16,971 degrees, diplomas, and certificates to women in 2019-20, a one-year decrease of 2.9%. Over the 10-year period from 2009-10 to 2019-20, the total number of degrees and other awards granted to women increased 10.2%.
- Meanwhile, 13,200 degrees and other awards were granted to men in 2019-20, a one-year decrease of 5.3%. Between 2009-10 and 2019-20, the total number of degrees and other awards granted to men increased 11.4%.
- While the gender gap varied slightly from one year to another, women consistently earned higher percentages of the degrees and other awards conferred by Nebraska postsecondary institutions than men. Over the last 10 years, the gap decreased from 13.0 percentage points in 2009-10 to 12.4 percentage points in 2019-20.










DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by GENDER by AWARD LEVEL




CLASSIFICATION OF RACE/ETHNICITY

Beginning with the collection of data for the 2007-08 academic year, IPEDS started the transition to the full adoption of new categories of race/ethnicity. Institutions were given the option of using the "old" or "new" categories to report the number of degrees and awards conferred by race/ethnicity in 2007-08, 2008-09, and 2009-10. Adoption of the revised categories was mandatory beginning with data reported for the 2010-11 academic year.

"Race/ethnicity (new definition): Categories developed in 1997 by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) that are used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. The designations are used to categorize U.S. citizens, resident aliens, and other eligible non-citizens." (Data source: IPEDS Glossary)






TOTAL DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by KNOWN and UNKNOWN RACE/ETHNICITY

- Nebraska's postsecondary institutions awarded 29,068 degrees, diplomas, and certificates to students of known race/ethnicity in 2019-20, a one-year decrease of 1,274 students (4.2%). Over the 10-year period from 2009-10 to 2019-20, the number of degrees and awards granted to students of known race/ethnicity increased 13.3%.
- Meanwhile, 1,103 degrees and other awards were granted to students of unknown race/ethnicity in 2019-20, a one-year increase of 2.7%. Between 2009-10 and 2019-20, the number of degrees and other awards conferred to students of unknown race/ethnicity decreased 30.5%.






DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by RACE/ETHNICITY








DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by RACE/ETHNICITY by AWARD LEVEL





The analyses in this section are based on the number of degrees and other awards conferred by discipline cluster.


"Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP): A taxonomic coding scheme for secondary and postsecondary instructional programs. It is intended to facilitate the organization, collection, and reporting of program data using classifications that capture the majority of reportable data. The CIP is the accepted federal government statistical standard on instructional program classifications and is used in a variety of education information surveys and databases."

"CIP Code: A six-digit code in the form xx.xxxx that identifies instructional program specialties within educational institutions." (Data source: IPEDS Glossary)

CIP codes are updated approximately every 10 years by the National Center for Education Statistics. Beginning with the collection of awards for the 2019-20 academic year, IPEDS implemented the use of 2020 CIP codes. Since the *Factual Look* report focuses on discipline clusters for analyses, the only substantive change that affected Nebraska institutions is that veterinary-related programs are now reported under CIP 1 (agricultural/animal/plant/veterinary science and related fields) rather than CIP 51 (health professions and related programs). This change means that the veterinary-related programs are coded under the STEM discipline cluster, rather than the Health discipline cluster, beginning with awards conferred in 2019-20.

The following discipline clusters are based on the two-digit CIP codes defined by the National Center for Education Statistics.





TOTAL DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by DISCIPLINE CLUSTER






TOTAL DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by AWARD LEVEL by DISCIPLINE CLUSTER






TOTAL DEGREES AND OTHER AWARDS CONFERRED by DISCIPLINE CLUSTER by AWARD LEVEL



CLASSIFICATION OF AGE GROUP

Beginning with the collection of data for the 2011-12 academic year, IPEDS collects data on the number of students who earned awards by age group.¹

Unlike the preceding sections of this report, which analyze the number of degrees and other awards conferred, the analyses in this section focus on the number of completers who received degrees by award level.

"Completer: A student who receives a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award. In order to be considered a completer, the degree/award must actually be conferred." (Data source: IPEDS Glossary)

<u>Each student is counted only once per award level.</u> For example, if a student is awarded two bachelor's degrees, the student is only counted once. If a student is awarded an associate's degree and a bachelor's degree, that student is counted once at the associate's level and once at the bachelor's level.

Another important distinction between Sections 1 through 5 and Section 6 is that IPEDS award levels are consolidated for data collected on age groups. As outlined on pages 2.2 and 2.3, IPEDS currently utilizes 12 award levels for data collected on the number of awards. However, for data collected on the number of completers, IPEDS utilizes only eight award levels. As outlined in the following table, the notable differences between the awards levels are 1.) Postbaccalaureate and post-master's certificates are reported as one category for age group data (prohibiting the Commission from collapsing bachelor's degrees with postbaccalaureate certificates and collapsing master's degrees with post-master's certificates), and 2.) Research/scholarship, professional practice, and other doctoral degrees are reported as one category for age group data (prohibiting the Commission from analyzing doctoral degrees by classification).

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




COMPLETERS by KNOWN and UNKNOWN AGE GROUP

- As shown in the table below, the age groups of the vast majority of completers are known.











COMPLETERS by AGE GROUP by AWARD LEVEL


