PRESENTATION

Dr. Baumgartner introduced Dr. Neal Grandgenett, University of Nebraska at Omaha, Corey Hatt, Central Community College, and Mike Flesch, Metropolitan Community College, who gave a presentation on the Nebraska Math Readiness Project. The project is in its third year and is a collaboration between the six community colleges, many Nebraska high schools, and the University system. PowerPoint slides showed three-year results highlighting the successes and challenges of the project. Dr. Grandgenett indicated that math education and readiness for college is a massive challenge nationwide. Across Nebraska, the Math Readiness Project is a strategic effort to provide a pathway for students who struggle with math and prepare them for college.

First Quarter Budget Report given by Kadi Lukesh, Budget Coordinator Dr. Baumgartner called on Kadi Lukesh to present the First Quarter Budget Report. Ms. Lukesh noted this quarter ended September 30 and explained why the report looks as though we overspent. At the beginning of July, the Midwest Higher Education Compact dues were paid along with one-time annual payments for accounting and auditing services and purchasing. Public Hearing on Matters of General Concern

Public Hearing on Academic Programs Committee Items Grant Program (NOG), the Community College Gap Assistance Program, and the Access College Early Scholarship (ACE).

Dr. Baumgartner thanked Mike Wemhoff, Facilities Officer, for 30 years of service to the Commission, documenting over 300 capital construction projects. He welcomed new Facilities Officer Jeremy Chancellor and asked him to introduce himself. Mr. Chancellor comes from the National Guard and is originally from McCook, Nebraska.

Dr. Baumgartner recently attended the Midwestern Higher Education Compact meeting in Grand Rapids, MI, while Commissioner Frison participated via Zoom. The meeting included updates on MHEC's purchasing and insurance programs, strategic planning, and how Wisconsin, Iowa, and Kansas are working with Credential Engine as part of the Midwest Credential Transparency Alliance.

In November Dr. Baumgartner attended the Higher Learning Commission State Agencies Annual Meeting in Chicago. The main topic was accreditation processes. The HLC has changed its bylaws so it can accredit institutions anywhere in the U.S.

Dr. Baumgartner noted he will be meeting virtually with the presidents of Nebraska's independent colleges and universities next week to present the case for a state educational attainment goal and ask for their support.

Recent staff happenings included Dr. Kathleen Fimple, Academic Programs Officer, traveling to Washington DC for SHEEO's Higher Education Policy Conference. J. Ritchie Morrow, Financial Aid Officer, participated in the Metropolitan Omaha Education Consortium's committee on dual credit, and Ritchie also has been attending the Federal Student Aid virtual training this week.

Dr. Baumgartner reminded Commissioners that there is a virtual Lottery briefing on December 7, and a link is available if they would like to attend.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

Commissioner Kelly, Committee Chair, opened the Academic Programs Committee portion and introduced the first agenda item.

<u>University of Nebraska Medical Center - Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Medical Physiology, MS</u>

Dr. Fimple asked Dr. Matt Zimmerman, Associate Professor, Department of Cellular and Integrative Physiology and Director, Integrative Physiology and Molecular Medicine Doctoral Program at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, to come forward to discuss the proposal. The proposed program is on-line and designed for a student population that is seeking physiology teaching positions in the community colleges or at a four-year institution as an adjunct teacher as well as those intending to apply to a health profession school. Dr. Fimple noted several letters of support were received in favor of this program. Dr. Zimmerman answered Commissioner's questions.

Commissioner Kelly stated the AP Committee recommendation is to approve the Master of Science degree in Medical Physiology at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

<u>University of Nebraska Medical Center - Proposal for a New Instructional Program - Perioperative Nursing, Undergraduate Certificate</u>

Dr. Fimple presented the proposal, stating this program would be a hybrid, delivered on-line, and have in-person labs and clinicals in the student's own hometown. Perioperative nursing includes everything from pre-operative care, operating room time, post-operative and recovery time. Dr. Fimple noted this program would reduce the cost of on-the-job training at hospitals and the need and demand is high. UNMC would like to offer this program in January 2022, and then the 15-week program would be offered in the summer only. There are no programs like this offered in Nebraska. Dr. Lynnette Leeseberg Stamler, Professor and Associate Dean for Academic Programs, College of Nursing at UNMC, stated that UNMC has qualified staff willing to teach the program and a recent survey had a large response reflecting demand for this program. Dr. Leeseberg Stamler answered questions from the Commissioners.

Commissioner Kelly stated the Committee recommendation is to approve the Undergraduate Certificate in Perioperative Nursing at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

BUDGET, CONSTRUCTION, AND FINANCIAL AID COMMITTEE

Commissioner Daniels, Committee Chair, opened the Committee report, noting the Budget Committee met recently to review the following three reports.

Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship AY 2020-2021 Year-end Report

Mr. Morrow presented the report stating the ACE scholarships pay tuition and mandatory fees for qualified, low-income high school students to enroll in college courses from Nebraska universities or colleges. For 2020-2021, the ACE program was funded with \$1.1 million dollars appropriated by the Legislature. There were 2,433 students from 231 high schools that received 4,518 scholarships. The average award per scholarship was \$218.97. Mr. Morrow reviewed graphs on scholarships awarded, credit hours taken, eligibility, and gender and race/ethnicity of recipients. He spoke on college continuation rates, noting ACE students are doing very well going on to

Commissioner Daniels, on behalf of the Budget, Construction, and Financial Aid Committee, moved to approve the Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship AY 2020-2021 Year-End Report. A roll call vote was taken. All seven Commissioners present voted yes. The motion carried.

Nebraska Opportunity Grant (NOG) AY 2020-2021 Year-end Report

Mr. Morrow presented the report, commenting that every year the CCPE is appropriated general funds from the legislature for the Nebraska Opportunity Grant, and those funds are combined with the Nebraska Lottery Funds that we receive to award each year. The NOG program uses information from the federal Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine eligibility. Mr. Morrow noted that Nebraska ranked 34th in the country for need-based undergraduate grant dollars per undergraduate enrollment. For the 2020-2021 award year, \$21,087,141 was awarded to 13,109 students with the average award being \$1,608.60. He gave an overview of the NOG funding by source, sector, and family income over the past 10 years. Mr. Morrow reviewed allocation funds listed in the report for each participating institution from 2010-2011 through 2020-2021.

Community College Gap Assistance Program 2020-2021 Annual Report

Gary Timm, Chief Finance and Administrative Officer, presented the Community College Gap Assistance Program report, noting this report has been submitted to the Nebraska Community College Student Performance and Occupational Education Grant Committee. The committee requires community colleges to report basic demographic, program, and employment data for each participant to gauge effectiveness of the Gap Assistance program. The committee is made up of representatives from Nebraska's Department of Education, Department of Economic Development, Department of Labor, and three of the six community colleges, as well as the CCPE. The program is designed to provide financial aid to low-income community college students enrolled in credit or non-credit programs that do not qualify for federal Pell grants. Mr. Timm pointed out the number of applicants and approved participants. The report lists all the programs of study at each of the community colleges.

<u>2021 Measuring Accomplishments, companion piece to Chapter One</u> of the Comprehensive Statewide Plan for Postsecondary Education

Ms. Heese gave a PowerPoint presentation on the 2021 Measuring Accomplishments Report, noting that this is the sixth edition and is a companion piece to Chapter One of the *Comprehensive Statewide Plan for Postsecondary Education*. The report includes national and peer comparisons as well as non-comparative measures and is updated on an annual basis. Ms. Heese stated the goal is to be in the ten best states for the national comparisons and the top five institutions for their respective peer group comparisons. Nebraska ranked in the top 10 for ACT college readiness. Nebraska ranked in the top 25 for its high school graduation rate, college continuation rate, and six-year college completion rates. Ms. Heese noted the Data Dictionary describes each of the measures in detail.

Chair Aspen read and presented Commissioner Adam with Resolution 21-1, thanking her for more than 17 years of service on the Commission. Commissioner Adam expressed her gratitude, not only to the Commissioners, but to the staff, stating it had been an honor and pleasure to work with everyone on the Commission. Description

Educational neuroscience is a field that focuses on the neurological processes underlying learning and education in typically and atypically developing populations. It brings together researchers in basic neuroscience, applied neuroscience in education, and child psychology. The proposed program would focus on emotional and cognitive development and on the neural foundations of speech and language development and literacy.

The 12-credit hour curriculum would consist of two required courses (six credit hours) and two (six credit hours) elective courses. The required courses are Psychology 865: Behavioral Neuroscience, and Educational Psychology 922: Mind, Brain, and Education. The elective courses would be selected from a list of five—one in Educational Psychology, two in Speech/Language Pathology, and two in Neuroscience (offered by UNMC). The elective courses would allow students to tailor the certificate to either cognitive or language development. No new courses would be needed, and all courses would apply to a master's degree in Special Education and Communication Disorders or Educational Psychology.

Letters of support were provided by the Department of Special Education and Communication Disorders, the Department of Psychology, and the College of Arts and Sciences.

Additional information on the use of educational neuroscience research by K-12 school districts would enhance the proposal.

B. Demand for the Program

UNL reports that Special Education and Communication Disorders faculty and Educational Psychology faculty consistently receive inquiries from prospective graduate students about the availability of an

educational neuroscience program. In addition, the Department of Psychology recently developed a neuroscience option for undergraduate psychology majors in response to high levels of student interest in the field. In a letter of support, the Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences states that the proposed program has the potential to appeal to students in several of the college's programs, especially psychology and biological sciences.

UNL estimates that in the first year of the program the enrollment would be approximately four students. Those students would complete the program in the second year with four new students matriculating. That would result in a steady enrollment of eight students every year.

Although specific numbers evidencing student interest weren't provided, the projected enrollments appear reasonable.


C. Avoidance of Unnecessary Duplication

There are no graduate certificate programs in educational neuroscience in Nebraska. UNL reports that as of March 2019 there appeared to be less than 10 in the United States. Commission staff also identified a small

number of programs, including the University of Pennsylvania, Butler University, Drexel University, and Bridgewater State University. Some are online and some have a focus significantly different from that of the proposed program. For example, Butler University's program emphasizes adversity/trauma and the brain.

D. Resources: Faculty/Staff



The Department of Special Education and Communication Disorders would serve as the administrative home for the program. UNL states that since all courses are in place and taught by tenure-track faculty, no new

faculty would be required. One letter of support notes that the Neuroscience and Behavior Ph.D. program is the second largest in the Department of Psychology and has 11 core faculty. The same letter states that there are five resident faculty at UNL's Center for Brain, Biology, and Behavior (an interdisciplinary center that brings together faculty in the social, biological, and behavioral sciences and engineering).

Several new courses have been proposed that may be added in the future, but no new resources are needed to initiate the program.

Facility Operating and Maintenance Costs Inflationary Adjustment January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2023

Background: The Commission reviews, approves or disapproves, and monitors capital construction projects submitted by public postsecondary education institutions. Included are new capital structures, or any proposed addition, renovation, or acquisition of a capital structure that would be financed with tax funds above a minimum threshold.

Legislation: LB 440, signed by the Governor on May 22, 2009, revised the minimum capital expenditure threshold as follows: 1) a total project cost for construction or acquisition with at least \$2,000,000 in tax funds, or 2) for facility operations and maintenance (O&M) costs, a project that is likely, as determined by the institution, to result in an incremental increase of at least \$85,000 in tax funds in any one fiscal year within a period of ten years from the date of substantial completion or acquisition of the project. The \$2,000,000 threshold for tax funds used for construction or acquisition costs does not include an inflationary adjustment. The facility O&M costs threshold requires the Commission to review and make adjustments for inflation biennially.

Statutory language: Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-1402 defines the threshold for facility operations and maintenance (O&M) costs as a base amount of eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000) for any one fiscal year. The base amount for the facility's operations and maintenance costs shall be subject to any inflationary or market adjustments made by the commission pursuant to this subdivision. The commission shall adjust the base amount on a biennial basis beginning January 1, 2010. The adjustments shall be based on percentage changes in a construction cost index and any other published index relevant to operations and utilities costs, both as selected by the commission in cooperation with the public institutions. The index or indices shall reflect inflationary or market trends for the applicable operations and maintenance or construction costs.

Methodology: LB 440's \$85,000 facility O&M costs threshold took effect in August 2009. The Commission has used the Commonfund Institute's annual Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) to measure facility O&M costs inflation. Sub-indices within HEPI that are relevant to facility O&M costs include: personnel compensation, supplies & materials costs, and utilities costs. The 2009 HEPI data has served as the starting point to measure inflationary increases for purposes of LB 440. Over the past 12 years the weighted facilities O&M cost index increased 12.84% to \$95,915 (see attached table).

Review Process: Commission staff submitted its methodology and recommendation to representatives of the University of Nebraska, Nebraska State Colleges, and Nebraska Community Colleges on December 16, 2021, requesting comments or recommended modifications. Institutions have not indicated any objections or suggested revisions to the Commission's methodology or recommendation to date. Committee Recommendation: It is recommended that the facility O&M costs threshold for review remain an incremental increase in tax funds of \$95,000/year for the biennial period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2023.
